What the Executive Order Privatizing K-12 Education Means for Your Campus

Title of EO	Expanding Educational Freedom and Opportunity for Families (January 29, 2025)
What is the policy?	 Enables the twelve Republican-led states that have already enacted universal K-12 scholarship programs to obtain federal formula funds for private and faith-based schools as well as public charter schools after a 60-day study period by the secretary of ed. Incentivizes additional states to underwrite private schools with federal discretionary grants and redirected block grants.
How does it affect campus communities?	 Undermines college preparedness among future cohorts of students because the schools funded are not held to the same standards as public schools. Undercuts schools of education, which prepare teachers for public education in particular. Enables state officials to enrich their private-sector education partners' political clout.
Who else is under attack?	 Differently-abled students will be disadvantaged because their inclusion is not required by the schools that will take funds from those that are currently obligated to serve all. Students from low-wealth families, particularly Black and brown students, have been shown to suffer most from "educational freedom." Rural communities will lose the assurance of sound education and local institutions that build and serve the wider community. Bureau of Indian Education schools will see federal tax funds diverted to private schools. Defenders of free speech, the First Amendment, and academic freedom. American democracy, which requires an informed and educated citizenry.
Who benefits?	 Private interests that have long sought to convert the \$800 billion public education "industry" into a profit source. Catholic, Christian nationalist, and other religious entrepreneurs who have long sought tax funds for their sectarian schools. Segregationists who have sought tax-funded school vouchers since the era of massive resistance to Brown v. Board of Education. Libertarian donors and the economists they patronize to promote the privatization of public goods. Authoritarian leaders.
What can you do / How do we fight back?	 If your child or community suffers harm from the EO, consider becoming a plaintiff in litigation against it with the pro bono <u>Democracy2025</u>. Urge your local media to cover the story of how this policy undermines education for all. Reach out to influential local organizations to alert them to the harms and seek their support. Connect with state education advocates such as <u>Save our Schools Arizona</u> and national <u>pro-public education organizations</u> for resources, guidance, and mutual support. Join your campus union. If there is no union on your campus, <u>join the AAUP</u> as an active or associate member. If you or someone you know is adversely impacted by the EOs, share your story with lawyers at <u>Democracy 2025</u>, <u>LDF</u>, or <u>Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights Under Law</u>. Write an op-ed in your local paper, weekly journal, blog post, etc. to share how students, staff, and administrators are being targeted by this EO and share with CDAF@aaup.org.
